West Lothian Fencing Club believes that every child has the right to experience sport in a safe environment, free from abuse and bullying.

Clubs play an important role in creating a positive ethos that challenges bullying. Clubs should understand the impact of bullying and to agree to standards of behaviour and tackle any unacceptable behaviour.

West Lothian Fencing Club will:

- recognise its duty of care and responsibility to safeguard all participants from harm
- promote and implement this anti-bullying policy in addition to our safeguarding policy and procedures
- seek to ensure that bullying behaviour is not accepted or condoned
- take action to investigate and respond to any alleged incidents of bullying
- ensure that coaches and the club welfare officer are given access to information, guidance and on bullying

Each participant, coach, volunteer or official will:

- respect every child's need for, and rights to, a play environment where safety, security, praise, recognition and opportunity for taking responsibility are available
- respect the feelings and views of others
- recognise that everyone is important and value that our differences make each of us special
- show appreciation of others by acknowledging individual qualities, contributions and progress
- be committed to the early identification of bullying, and take prompt and collective action to deal with it
- ensure safety by carefully explaining rules and practices and displaying these for all to see
- report incidents of bullying they see by doing nothing you are condoning bullying

Bullying

- the club will address all forms of bullying
- everybody in the club/organisation has a responsibility to work together to stop bullying
- bullying can include online as well as offline behaviour
- bullying can include: -
 - physical pushing, kicking, hitting, pinching.
 - name calling, sarcasm, spreading rumours, persistent teasing and emotional torment through ridicule, humiliation or the continual ignoring of individuals
 - posting of derogatory or abusive comments, videos or images on social network sites racial taunts, graffiti, gestures, sectarianism
 - sexual comments, suggestions or behaviour
 - unwanted physical contact

Children with a disability, from ethnic minorities, young people who are gay or lesbian, or those with learning difficulties are more vulnerable to this form of abuse and are more likely to be targeted.

Support for the child:

- children should know who will listen to and support them
- the club will aim to have an open the door to children wishing to talk about bullying or any issues that affect them
- identify and address at the outset any potential barriers children may have to talking to adults for help (including those associated with a child's disability or impairment)
- children should have access to Helpline numbers

- we will listen and support anyone who reports an incident of bullying
- we will objectively investigate any reported incident of bullying and will listen to all those involved
- we will support bullied children and ensure their right to play in a safe environment
- we will support those who bully and encourage them to stop and if necessary use appropriate sanctions which do not make these individuals look or feel foolish in front of others

Support to the parents/guardians:

- we will advise parents/guardians on the club's anti-bullying policy and practice
- we will discuss any incident of bullying with the child's parent(s)/guardians
- we will consult and seek an agreement with parents on any action the club will take (for both victim and bully)
- we will provide information and advice on coping with bullying
- we will offer support to the parent(s) including information on other agencies or support lines.
